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

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
What They Don't Tell You in Freshers' Week







'Ear we go again ...

an interview with Evander Holyfield



Evander Holyfield may not be the "prettiest", like Muhammad Ali, or the meanest, like Mike Tyson but he is a boxer who epitomises the sport like no other. He has won the World Heavyweight Championship a record four times and is chasing the dream of a fifth title.

After being raised in the "ghetto", Evander recalls his incredible journey and how his "momma's whippings" meant he didn't end up like Tyson, the man who infamously bit off and spat out a chunk of his ear, and the 'animal' he is about to face once again in this year's biggest bout.

Peering through the window where the interview was to take place, Evander was sitting quietly with a can of Cola. As I

entered the room, after a light knock on the door, he immediately stood up to his full 6' 3". Although his imposing height wasn't threatening, his stance certainly was. He had adopted the 'toe to toe' standing position boxers use, while in the ring, into his everyday life, which was intimidating to say the least.

"I wasn't always the biggest, but I was the youngest of nine so I was tough", he proudly boasts.

Observing the 'crème de la crème' of sporting entertainment one can easily understand why he is so successful, and it becomes easy to understand why he's one of the most likeable boxers in the oftmaligned sport. Despite having millions of dollars in the bank and fame beyond

belief, he is no 'flash Harry'.

Sat slouched in his chair, wearing a pair of jeans, boots and a chequered shirt he credits his mother, Laura Holyfield, for teaching him about Christian values and the honor in being humble.

"My mother was very instrumental, and taught me to respect other people.

My brothers and sisters realise had they done more of what my mother had told them to do, they probably would have been successful as well."

Holyfield, the youngest of nine said: "I'm just one woman away, (my mother), from being the same as Mike Tyson. My Mother said, you go to school, you listen, and you do what that teacher tells you do to. I would've ended up like him had my momma not been so tough and strong."

The man who's been called 'God's champion', was never supposed to make anything of his life. He was told over and over again that he was too poor, too inarticulate, and too black to break the grip of poverty and despair. But armed with a strong faith in succeeding, a strong selfbelief, and a strong jaw, Holyfield defied the odds and rewrote boxing history, by earning more than \$150 million.

Living by the philosophy that "no one chooses their start, but everyone can choose their finish", Evander amazingly went from being paid a mere \$2.65 an hour for his first job at the age of 17, to an eye watering \$34 million, in 1997, to fight Mike Tyson for the second time, which he admits was: "the largest amount ever paid for a single performance in any field."

Holyfield had knocked out 'Mad Mike' in

their first fight and was set to do it again, until Tyson bit off a chunk of his ear. It was found on the bloodied canvas and given back to the champion in an iced plastic bag as he was rushed to hospital.

Leaping out of his seat, he explained: "It was painful. I was shocked, because it's not something you expect."

However it was not the first time he had experienced the sensation of his flesh being bitten. "I've been bitten a lot of times ... I didn't take it as anything other than Mike wanted to get out. He quit, he didn't want to fight anymore."

Although Holyfield won the bout against his raging and disqualified opponent, he is now set for a third encounter with 'Iron Mike'.

He explains: "I realise if I want to be Heavyweight Champion, I have to attract the champions to fight me. If I fight Mike Tyson, I would do that ... I can't walk away. I have to retire as undisputed Heavyweight Champion. I know that I am supposed to. I know that I can. It's a matter of being patient."

The boxer says one secret to his success has been his approach to life. "It's impossible to be me. But you can be yourself and achieve what I've achieved if you listen, follow direction, and not quit. God made everyone special.

You just have to realise how special you are by working hard at what you want to achieve."

As I stood up to leave, Evander shook my hand and waved goodbye, saying, "Take care James".

A lot of consumers turn a blind eve to the poor sweatshop conditions and unethically produced garments - Plastique magazine recently reported that according to the IFTF (Internation Fur Trade Federation) "consumers spent \$15.02 billion dollars(!) on fur in 2007, an increase of 11.3% over the previous year." Even with the excessive negative press the fur industry receives regarding its inhumane ethics and involvement in fashion - this doesn't stop the publics consumption.

There are hundreds of ethical shops in the high street including M&S, Timberland, Gossypium and my favourite American Apparel. Online shops are also useful and there are hundreds of ethical fashion designers selling on websites. Log on to www.fairtrade.com or www.ethicsgirl. co.uk to get the complete lowdown on who to support.

Stine: SJ went into the crowd and when he came back one of his shoe laces was gone which was really weird...


What can we expect from the album?

Doing the rounds on the London 80s circuit DTAT gained themselves a loyal following and played amazing venues such as The Astoria, The Empire Leicester Square and The Hammersmith Palais. Being unsigned didn't stop them from getting their fair share of media attention. In 1987 they even gatecrashed the Brit Awards and radio 1 DJ Peter Powell said that their entrance was the highlight of his evening.

Unfortunately they never got their big break despite interest from major labels. But last year they reformed and came through to the top two in a Virgin Radio competition where they gave old bands a chance to be heard once again. And unsurprisingly they loved their sound and wanted to give them another shot at he big time. With 80s music becoming popular once again the timing couldn't have been better.

Catching up with Dan he tells me his feelings on being back in a band again, "It's been great to get back into playing music again, although I'm not sure this is how I would have planned it."

Things are a bit easier 20 years on, 'everything is exactly the same, strangely, No one has changed one bit, although hairs are definitely greyer. We are finding it is much simpler to make music and find an immediate fanbase. There's no need to play aigs anymore in dodgy pubs for just £30."

Winning the contest and playing at Hyde park 'would have been a dream come true, but we had to settle for a warm up gig at a finy London venue called the







Troubadour where Bob Dylan played in the 1960s. The atmosphere was great. It was a balmy summer's evening and friends and family came away pleasantly surprised (I think!)."

He doesn't fancy their chances at breaking into the notoriously impossible top ten, although they did get to number one in the indie charts, "There are plans for another single in he new year so it looks like there'll be another assault on the charts."

Where they are today?

They've rewritten their last hit 'One Last Dream' and it peaked at an impressive 27 in the charts. It's available from ITunes, HMV and Amazon, it has an excellent mix of a vintage and fresh sound that you wont get out of your head all day. Tropic Thunder By Matt Perry

Yes Man - 4/5 stars

The key to the success of TROPIC THUNDER would have been for the audience to walk in with low expectations. Sadly, that is nigh on impossible, what with the huge advertising campaigns preceding it, the summer blockbuster spot it managed to secure in the States last year, and, of course, its Alist cast, which goes some way to explaining its \$100 million plus budget.

With expenses in mind then, there is no denying the visual quality of the film. In terms of sheer spectacle TROPIC THUNDER exceeds on all levels, with fantastic set-pieces that look and feel real; Stiller, as director, seems to have had

in mind when writing the script, and a lot of time and effort has obviously been spent on the believability of the environment in which the action takes place. And, solely as a pastiche of jungle warfare films (the likely comparisons being Platoon and Apocalypse Now) it most definitely succeeds.

But, ultimately, the film is a comedy (or should be) and with the talented likes of Ben Stiller and Jack Black on show, TROPIC THUNDER leaves a lot to be desired.

There are certainly moments of genius

- the fake trailers at the film's opening
are an inventive way of introducing the
main characters - and the boundaries

of Hollywood comedy are pushed to the very limit - Stiller's 'Simple Jack' character, for one, certainly stands out in the mind.

Despite these special moments, the film is nowhere near a 'laugh-a-minute' and with the exception of Downey Jr.'s 'Lazurus', the characters are all one-dimensional. Lacking comedy, the script also lacks any narrative intrigue. Stiller's Speedman is as forgetful as half his characters of late, and Black's drugaddicted superstar is simply a constant repeat of the same 'coke-craving' joke.

The supporting cast are completely sidelined, which is a shame as there is a lot of talent on show: Coogan, Nolte, McConaughey to name but a few.

The one saving grace for TROPIC THUNDER is Downey Jr. His Lazarus character is sheer genius, "I'm the dude playing the dude, disguised as another dude!", and will go down as one of the great comedy creations, which is surprising as Downey Jr. is the one noncomedy actor in the primary cast.

Ultimately, despite the quality cinematography and talent on show, TROPIC THUNDER fails to be a consistently funny film. In terms of entertainment value, maybe it succeeds, but it most certainly is not the memorable comedy one would have hoped for.

The Curious Case of Benjamin Button (Feb 6)

Brad Pitt plays a man who is born old and wrinkled and lives his life backwards in David Fincher's romantic adaptation of an F. Scott Fitzgerald story. The film, whose centrepiece is a romance between a couple who age in opposite directions, sees a departure from his unusual brooding signature. Expect a poignant, tour-de-force from the Se7en director.

Inglourious Basterds (Aug 16)



o as I sat at Heathrow on my own at my boarding gate, I knew this had to be a summer I would never forget. I had applied to be a specialist Counsellor at Camp Chipinaw, just two hours outside of New York, in the middle of no where, with absolutely no phone signal, Madness? Of

I was bracing myself to be thrown into the deep end with hundreds of kids with too much energy, or 'spirit'. As a first timer at camp, I had an extremely vague idea of what to expect, like smores, bedtime stories and chanting and cheering. The contract did not state that you would do things that you never thought you would do, make a complete tit out of yourself in front of hundreds of kids and staff (and enjoy it), and challenge yourself beyond your limits. Camp has such a great atmosphere. Everyone is there to enjoy themselves, make new friends and carry out the traditions of camp. The day starts at 7am when you are awoken by the campus leader shouting in the loudspeaker, then it's breakfast, chores, 6 activities with funch in between, shower hour, dinner, free play, evening activity, canteen (a sugary snack which wakes those kiddles right up) and then (eventually) bed. And if you are on duty you have to stay awake and outside the cabin on the porch until 12.30am. So, you do the maths. The average day can be






