Depression hits students in first term

The beginning of university has been recognised as a key time when students may be more vulnerable to depression

∧ s the new term commences, new Aand returning students will enjoy freshers celebrations and the new freedoms that University living brings - however, moving away from home and the stresses of the student lifestyle can contribute to a downward spiral for some.

More students than ever are seeking help for depression and being away from home and from familiar support networks such as friends and family can cause some to feel isolated. Money worries also weigh heavy on the minds of many students and the typical student lifestyle of late nights, heavy drinking and possible lack of exercise – can all increase vulnerability to depression.

There are organisations out there, that can help you cope throughout the year, such as Students Against Depression, which communicates stories of student sufferers online and offers a three-step guide on how to get help.

If you, or someone you know is suffering, there are warning signs that you may start to notice.



The Warning Signs

- 1) Persistently sad, anxious, empty or generally low mood
- 2) Loss of interest
- Lethargy or decreased energy 3)
- 4) Irregular sleep or change in sleep
- Appetite of weight changes
- Increased tearfulness
- 8) Poor concentration and difficulty making decisions
- Hopelessness and pessimism
- 10) Feelings of helplessness
 - 11) Feelings of worthlessness or guilt
 - 12) Thoughts of death or suicide

am your Vice President Student Support Officer and I work in the Students' Union Advice Centre. For those new students who don't know, the Students' Union Advice Centre is on the ground floor of the Students Union building.

The Advice Centre deals with all the issues that students face during their time here at Solent University. As your elected Student Support officer I deal primarily with any issues surrounding the academic aspect of your student lives. These may include problems relating to examinations, appeals, academic misconduct (e. g plagiarism or collusion), progression to the next stage of your course and transferring courses. If you are affected by any of these issues, it is important to seek advice from us.

We have an independent advisor who can help you with welfare issues. This includes, health, personal wellbeing and housing advice. For many of you First Years this will be a valuable service, as this year many of you are living in the private sector within Southampton.

Here at the Student's Union we are **independent** from the University itself. All information is confidential and nothing is shared with any other agencies without your permission.

This year we ran the **Student Safety Programme** in the University's Andrews building outside of the Resource Centre. This covered important issues not only for those of you who are new to the city but

returners as well. Members of Hampshire Police Service, Hampshire Fire and Rescue and Hampshire Ambulance Service, together with a Health & Safety Gas Promo and information on self defence were all available. If you missed any of this, please pop in and we can help you find the information you want.

We also host a **Police Drop-In Service**, where students can have the opportunity to discuss issues with PCSO's (Police Community Support Officers) from the local area. This service runs on a Monday afternoon between 3pm– 4pm and can address any problems you have concerning personal safety or community matters.

As Student Support Officer I also deal with course representatives. **Course Reps** are a valuable part of university life, their role is to give the Students' Union and University feedback on their courses academic experiences. Every course should have a course rep for each year of study, they are there for you. If you are interested in being a course rep please contact your course leader.

Later in the academic year we will be holding a clinic where we invite you to join the **Bone Marrow Register**, this is just one of the many campaigns where your input is invaluable. Other campaigns include World Aids Day, Breast Cancer awareness and drink safety. Feel free to come forward with suggestion for what you feel should be brought to students' attention.

When I was 14, I knew I wanted to do something involving writing. Eventually I discovered journalism. Then I discovered a way of increasing my chances of actually getting there was by going to University. Unfortunately, what I didn't know was that what came as part of the package deal was a fist full of debt that I probably wasn't going to be getting out of until I was 30!

When I looked into it, I also discovered that all education was free, yes, free, before September 1998. Now, ten years on, tuition fees have inflated to £3,145 a year in most places, totalling up to a bank crippling £9435 for an adult just out of Uni, I may as well do my degree online, which I can get at roughly £1800, although there was a nice little message in brackets after saying 'reserves the rights to increase tuition fees in the future'.

So why exactly are we paying roughly £9300 to attain a degree just so I can be charged higher tax when I am earning the salary I'm worked so hard for? Why, if you're a student studying in Scotland, do you get free tuition, as in no fees at all, just what you occur through maintenance loans? And, why exactly am I paying this amount of money to better myself when there are people getting at least this amount money a year in benefits?! So many questions, so

little time! Now in 2008, the NUS estimate that the cost of being a student was £13,135. For anyone studying in London, it was around £15,214 an extra £2,079 just for studying in the big city.

"Labour has no plans to introduce tuition fees for Higher Education". Hmm, my ever-increasing university bill seems to scream differently!

1. Open a savings account.

THE EDINBURGH FILM FESTIVAL 2008

Now in its 62nd year, The Edinburgh International Film Festival is the longest continuously running film festival in the world.

Edinburgh saw some of Hollywood's biggest movie stars descend on the Scottish capital, stepping out onto the red carpet at Fountainbridge, for the opening night of the this year's festival. They had all gathered together to attend the World premiere of 'The Edge of Love', a story about the famous Welsh poet, Dylan Thomas.

Keira Knightley and Sienna Miller joined Matthew Rhys, who plays Dylan, at the star-studded red-carpet opening, alongside Scotland's most famous export and the festival's patron, Sir Sean Connery.The one time Bond actor was 'achin' but not stirred', in a 'shling'- if you'll forgive the pun - after a golfing accident the week before. Nevertheless, the Edinburgh born actor, who spent much of his early years living just down the road from the cinema, was in good spirits declaring, "It only hurts when I laugh, but it's getting better."

Sir Sean didn't speak to the press, somewhat appropriately, reminding me of that famous snippet of dialogue "Do you expect me to talk?", that has attained an almost legendary status, in the Bond series, as 007 is on the verge of being emasculated by Goldfinger's laser, in the 1964 epic.

Although 'The Edge of Love', opened the festival it was interestingly rejected for three possible categories at the Cannes Film Festival earlier this year, after it was called: 'extremely disappointing'. This, however, was something that didn't bother the film's director, John Maybury, as he is a big Edinburgh fan.

His film 'Love is the Devil', based on the life of the British artist Francis Bacon, won the festival's major trophy, the Michael Powell Award, ten years ago. In fact, he called it: "one of the best festivals in the world... a real film festival about cinema, about film-making, not about commerce" He joked, to loud laughter, at the film's press conference: "We are all chuffed to bits to be here. I'm really glad the French didn't take it for Cannes," adding, "the French festival, for all its lustre, was partly a hideous trade fair."

Most of the film was shot in Wales, Dylan Thomas' home, and the country plays a key role in the film.

Keira who plays Dylan's lover, Vera, said: "We were in West Wales the whole time. It was idyllic and I've already

been back for pleasure", while Matthew Rhys explained enthusiastically: "It really was the dream job to go to Wales over the summer and play Dylan Thomas. Everything ticked the boxes, the script, the cast. It was great."

Keira shot to fame at the tender age 17, when she appeared in 'Bend It Like Beckham'. Since then, it seems, she is always learning new skills for her films, whether it be playing football, or sword fighting. In this film she had to do all her singing.

She said: "I'd actually gone into a studio and recorded all the songs beforehand so I thought I'd be miming on set, but John Maybury, the director, came to me on the day and said no you are going to be singing it live in front of about two hundred people. I nearly died. But I was alright after someone kindly gave me a couple of shots of vodka."

The film, which is by no means a bio-pic in the traditional vain, was written by Keira's Mum, Sharman Macdonald. She said: "I'm absolutely delighted with it. It's a gorgeous film. It was remarkably easy writing for my daughter. She just wouldn't play the part I had written for her (laughs)."

After the films premiere I headed to the Teviot Union, one of Edinburgh University's older and more decorative structures in Bristo Square, after receiving an invite to the tightly guarded


after party, where 40's dress was a must. Given the media scrum that converged to catch Sienna and Keira on the red carpet the heavy security was quite a good thing.




Johnny Flynn and the Sussex Wit – Southampton Joiners, 28th October

Check Mate


Checks and tartan are hot this Autumn with the likes of D&G and Ralph Lauren putting a fresh twist on the traditional Scottish pattern.
